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SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found [HERE](#).

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. 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APPLICATION PROCESS FOR LEA ALLOCATIONS OF ARP-ESSER SEA RESERVE FUNDS

The federal ARP statute requires SEAs to reserve:

not less than 5 percent of the total amount of grant funds awarded to the State (\$449.4 million) to carry out activities to address the impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions;

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs; and

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive afterschool programs.

Yes, the LEA does intend to use American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act - Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding for construction-related expenditures.

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ARP-ESSER LEA Base 90% Allocation - Plan Development and Dissemination

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Title VIII of Division B of the CARES Act directs the Department to carry out the Education Stabilization Fund, of which the ARP ESSER funds are a part. Section 2001 of the ARP Act provides for the Department to make grants to each SEA from the ARP ESSER funds. 1. In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA meaningfully engaged a diverse and representative set of the applicable stakeholders in developing a plan to use these funds and implementing that plan.

HVA leaders and teachers closely monitor student literacy and math performance throughout the school year. During remote learning, it became apparent to HVA leaders and teachers that some students needed additional support, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. HVA became aware of these issues through feedback from families both verbally as well as through surveys. The surveys are a method of ensuring that the school involves families and engages in strong family connections to ensure that we continually improve to serve our children. The questions included: Do you have any concerns that we can address for you? In addition we asked: What is your preferred language and method of communication?" HVA ensured that parent voices were heard through the surveys which had a response rate in the high 90's. The outstanding survey response rate was a result of HVA leaders and faculty reaching out to families at the beginning of the pandemic to ensure that families were fully supported in every way including academically, emotionally, had enough food, and had access to a computer and Wi-Fi. HVA leaders then collaborated with department heads, grade team leaders, and educational consultants to research and agree upon a solution to address learning loss and other parent concerns from the surveys. Ultimately, the consensus resulted in an emphasis on addressing the academic impact of lost instructional time. HVA, collectively, elected to leverage the summer as an instructional opportunity and launch our 2021 Summer Learning Program which provided high dosage, small group tutoring; providing 1:5 consistent academic support to students in need of academic, social, emotional, and mental support. Additionally, after consulting with staff and faculty to further this program during the school year, HVA elected to hire Interventionists to continue our efforts to provide a high quality and high dosage instructional model throughout the school year to combat learning loss. HVA will continue to access parents and students concerns by regularly surveying the HVA community.

In the space provided below, please describe the extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.

HVA has partnered with Hensel Phelps, our facilities manager, to implement many additional procedures to ensure HVA grounds and buildings are safe and operational according to COVID-19 safety requirements. Hensel Phelps works closely with internal divisions dedicated to environment, health, safety, and procurement to provide a safe and sanitary environment for staff and students. Hensel Phelps adheres to guidelines from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention by increasing cleaning frequencies and disinfecting high-touch surfaces throughout each private campus. Hensel Phelps has developed and implemented operational plans to sustain enhanced cleaning & disinfecting frequencies for all high-use areas when the schools reopen, in addition to regular cleaning services, enhanced sanitation, and disinfection during periods of closure. Hensel Phelps also provides intensive training to HVA and HP staff in order to meet or exceed the safety measures according to the CDC guidelines and Department of Public Health protocols. Hensel Phelps has retrofitted most of the building air-handling system filters to Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value (MERV) 13 to 16 filters, as well as, inspect, clean, and maintain all building air-handling systems quarterly or as needed. HVA will also administer weekly COVID-19 testing for students, at random, to ensure the safety and well-being for all students, staff and educational partners.

HVA has strategically and thoughtfully planned highly effective, research-based interventions in response to and in order to support students' academic growth and social, emotional, and mental health. First, HVA designed and implemented a robust tutoring program that takes place afternoons and Saturdays, grounded in research on high dosage tutoring. The tutoring program provides a 45-60 minutes of effective tutoring 3-4 times per week to students in small groups with a small student-tutor ratio. In order to support the quality of this program, a Tutoring Manager was hired to design curricula, train tutors and provide instructional coaching. School systems ensure that student progress is monitored on a weekly and monthly basis through qualitative classroom observation and coaching as well as formal review of data from the Fountas & Pinnell reading assessment and math interim assessments which include formal teacher training, leadership coaching, and data-driven planning on a weekly and monthly basis. Data analysis is conducted on a regular basis to plan instruction, small group interventions, and individualized student support. In addition, we designed small group intervention as a regular feature of the daily schedule to provide targeted academic interventions for students in ELA and math. For example, all schools provide guided reading and elementary schools provide math coaching, using programs such as ST Math for K-2 students and Study Island and Dreambox for 3-5.

HVA also closely monitors students' social, emotional, and mental health or SEMH. Students SEMH is primarily monitored by HVA's social workers who receive ongoing training and monitoring. Social workers at HVA use multiple data sources to identify students' SEMH including formal review of counseling referrals, teacher statements, family surveys, attendance data, IEPs, DASA reports, ACS reports, and McKinney Vento reports. In addition, we engage parents to help our Social Workers identify students' SEMH through in-person conferencing, phone calls, emails, text messages, and meetings. Social Workers address SEMH issues through planned interventions including counseling and individualized support. The planned interventions and supports utilized at HVA are mandated as well as non-mandated counseling, external psychiatric and family counseling, advisory lessons on important SEL topics, student workshops and student mentoring. HVA regularly monitors students SEMH through the practices mentioned above.

HVA launched a Summer 2021 Learning Program which provided high dosage tutoring for our students in need. During the program, HVA provided Guided Reading and Close Reading for three 2-week cycles of tutoring, and developed curriculum for Close Reading and Novel Studies for Middle School tutoring. ELA tutors met with groups of 3-6 students organized by their reading level for 1.5 hours per day. Tutors worked with their students on critical reading comprehension skills to support their growth, and math tutors met with groups of 3-6 students for 1.5 hours per day to review foundational skills from the previous year. The program resulted in significant academic gains that enabled teachers and students to hit the ground running this school year; an outcome which prompted us to implement the same program during the summer of 2022.

HVA partnered with Center for Responsive Schools whom trained dozens of staff and leaders on student-centered, social and emotional learning approaches to teaching and discipline. These trainings were comprised of a set of research, and evidence-based practices designed to create safe, joyful, and engaging classrooms and school communities for both students and teachers. HVA will also continue to purchase supplies to sanitize and clean our facilities. Additionally, HVA will purchase educational technology, such as Chromebooks, for each of our incoming students, as well as, continuing to provide technology for online learning to all students.

The 2021 and 2022 Summer Learning and Afterschool Program will provide hours of extra support and intervention to students experiencing academic, social, emotional, and mental setbacks as a result of their time out of the classroom, in addition to access to high quality curriculum and assessments. The program addresses learning loss and students experiencing adverse effects due to the pandemic, as well as, lesson planning, instructional management planning, data analysis and real time coaching for teachers to address the academic impact of lost instructional time.

ARP-ESSER Return to In-Person Instruction

As we launch in-person learning for the first time in 15 months, we are adjusting our protocols to align with CDC recommendations, NYSDOH requirements and NYSED guidelines. We will assess the overall situation in New York City, including infection rates, family and staff perspectives, attendance rates, and the viability of public transportation. We will also learn from observing the actions and experiences of other educational institutions to determine if it is appropriate to transition to a hybrid environment in which students have the option of remote or in-person instruction. All staff and students are committed to implement and practice COVID-19 safety procedures and regular communication with families will occur from each school. In an emergency, we would use email and text communication to notify impacted families of any important information. The mass mailing technologies employed would be the same that were used when school shut down in March 2020. We are committed to ensuring a safe and productive environment for our students and staff members. HVA will stay abreast of any, and all, regulatory changes via regular attendance at webinars held by the NY Charter Association and NYC Charter School Center who host representatives from the NYC Department of Education, NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, and NYS Education Department. HVA will also engage families and students through surveys, which have been a very successful method of sourcing inputs from HVA families. Surveys will be frequent and will consist of open-ended questions to receive as much input from families as possible.

HVA hired Taurino Management, Inc., to replace very small, outdated, ceiling level unopenable windows on the 6th floor of a privately owned building. These, unopenable, window designs were inherited from the prior owners, Rice High School, whom previously used this space on the 6th floor as locker rooms. This space is now several instructional classrooms for K-3 students whom wouldn't have received fresh airflow without this project. Taurino Management, Inc. removed these extremely small windows, and reframed the walls for windows approximately 10x the size. The scope of the projecting, costing \$277,860, can be found below:
